CCLM by the Numbers in 2015

- Served 48, 829 meals & distributed 2472 bags of groceries.
- Welcomed 584 different men into our shelter for a total of 18,912 shelter nights.
- Nurtured 55 students in our after school program.
- Provided housing for 57 people living with HIV/AIDS.
- Provided 15 formerly sheltered men with transitional housing.
- Housed and fed 27 formerly incarcerated men under contract with the Cal State Reentry Initiative.

"Can you help him?"

Together WE Can!

The young white officer came into the case management office with all the confidence expected from a member of law enforcement. His gun, badge, and uniform made introductions for him as we asked "What can we do for you Officer?"

The young black man with him was the opposite. Avoiding eye contact, the officer spoke for him: "This young man approached my unit and asked me to arrest him because he didn't have any place to go and hadn't eaten for a couple of days. He said 'I'd be better off in jail.' So I brought him here. Can you help him?"

Yes we can. First food. He can sleep here and shower tonight. We can provide clothes and hygiene supplies. Then we'll work with him on identification and other goals to get started on an income.

Both of these men were local sons of San Bernardino, both in their 20's. One was making a decision, not to commit crime, but to take a punishment that, while severe, is more humane than that of being homeless. The other making a decision to take time out of a much overloaded day to connect a desperate man with more he requested - with the hope that his life could be more than incarceration.

The Inland Empire leads the nation in youth aged 18-24 who are disenfranchised – without employment, not in school, and without the skills to support themselves. We have work to do.

But every week at CCLM we also see young people who are the hope of our future - Mr. Cardinal Contestants from San Bernardino High School bringing supplies and engaging homeless men; college interns & volunteers; children serving alongside their families and their faith-based groups. We see people of different economic classes, ethnicities, traditions, cultures, and all ages, sharing - a meal, their kindness, and their many and varied gifts.

We need the compassionate and resourceful police officer, the skilled bilingual teacher, the young student, the retired volunteer, the working community member, the resident volunteer, the staff member, neighbors, grantors, and donors. We need you – so we can speak in the language of compassion very practically to answer the young officer and the young homeless man, "Yes, we can help. Let's get you something to eat."
